How to Exhibit at the Fair

1. Have the Secretary send you a prize list book. **There will be a membership number on the back cover if membership is current.** Also, an entry form will be enclosed.
2. Read the rules and regulations of the Fair carefully.
3. Fill out the entry form, listing the articles you have for competition. Each article has to have an entry tag attached to it.
4. Fill out the entry tag and attach to each article to be entered. If you have more than ten (10) articles, contact the Secretary before judging day for tags, which you can pick up.
5. Entry fee in all classes includes HST except for cattle-beef, Jersey, Ayrshire.
6. All articles for competition must be in Stormont Hall on **Friday of Fair week (Labour Day) from 8:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m.** *If the above time is not suitable, non-perishable exhibits can be brought to Stormont Hall on Thursday evening, 7:30-8:30pm.*
7. Anyone exhibiting at the Fair must become a member, except where specified. The cost is \$8.00. This covers the cost of printing a book and delivering it to you.

N.B. ALL CHEQUES TO BE CASHED BY DECEMBER 1, of current fair year otherwise they will be null and void.

To the Members of Stormont Agricultural Society

- 1) Every person shall be entitled to be a Member of the Society.
- 2) A Firm, or an Incorporated Company, may become a Member by payment of the regular fee, but the name of one person only in any one year may be entered as the representative or agent of such Firm or Company and that person only shall exercise the privileges of membership in the Society.
- 3) Requirements for membership: (a) Payment of the annual membership fee, as determined by the Board of Directors from time to time, by September 30th of the current year. (b) Attainment of the age of sixteen (16) years.
- 4) Associate Membership is open to those who do not meet all the requirements for full membership, but nevertheless declare an intention to pursue the stated purposes of the Society. Associate members shall not have voting rights or be eligible to serve as officers of the Association.
- 5) Privileges of Membership A Member, or Associate Member, shall be entitled to participate in the activities of the Society as shall be defined by the Board of Directors each year, but only Full Members may vote or hold office in the Society. In addition, only those who were members during the previous year are entitled to vote at the Annual Meeting.

**Certain awards are based on membership and years of service.*

*Membership fee for current year will be \$8. *All Exhibitors from prize money, the SAS will retain membership fees for ensuing year. *Any Exhibit Hall and Junior Department exhibitor should pick up prize money at Secretary's office on Monday during Fair.

Important Notice

Anyone in the Dominion of Canada can purchase a membership. However, this membership does not entitle anyone to free admission to the Fair.

Special Notice

Don't forget that all kinds of theatrical, circus and acrobatic performances, exhibitions or show, and all junketing or trafficking in fruits, goods, wares or merchandise, are FORBIDDEN and prohibited; without the consent of the Directors, on the Exhibition Grounds, or within three (3) hundred yards thereof; and any person who violates this rule will be liable to be removed by the officers, policemen or constables of the Society and be subject to the penalty prescribed in the Agricultural Act. The Society will not hold themselves responsible for any accident that may occur on the grounds.

Stormont Agricultural Society RULES AND REGULATIONS

- Every Exhibitor or Competitor must become a Member of the Society** and pay the membership fee if applicable to the Section/Event.
 - This fee only entitles the holder to exhibit at the Fair.
 - Enables the exhibitor to remove their exhibits on Monday of the Fair after 4:00 p.m. only.
 - All volunteers are encouraged to maintain society membership** which in turn provides insurance coverage for SAS work/volunteering.
 - Membership fee \$8.00(No HST).**
 - Membership does not provide gate admission.**
 - To facilitate maintaining an active list of 60 or more members, current and ensuing year membership will be deducted from prize payout if not already prepaid. Notify SAS office on the fair weekend if opting out of ensuing year membership.
 - Membership status / exhibitor numbers can be verified with the SAS Secretary and/or Treasurer.
- Entry fee - see specific Section/Event for details on the amount and when due.

- Entries - see specific Section/Event for details on the method of entry. See SAS website for online registration tool AssistExpo information link. You will need an account to enter through AssistExpo. <https://www.assistexpo.ca/stormont-county-fair>
- All exhibitors are required to sign a Media Release Agreement/Waiver.** It is part of the online entry process or on an Entry Form. If an exhibitor is under 18 years old, a parent/legal guardian is required to sign on their behalf.

- A)The media release is to authorize the Stormont Agricultural Society to display the submissions on their website or other official channels, and to be used for media purposes including promotional presentations and marketing campaigns.
- B)By signing the media release the exhibitor or parent/legal guardian also agrees that the submission is theirs and not the creation of someone else and confirms understanding that the plagiarism of another person's media material will result in an automatic disqualification.
- C)If entering online, the Media Release Agreement/Waiver must be completed and submitted.
- D)If entering using a Entry Form, please review carefully. Submitting the form indicates your understanding and acceptance of SAS use of provided information.
6. Any competitor having obtained a Prize by willful or corrupt means, fraud or misrepresentation, will forfeit all prize money for the year.
 7. When there is only one competitor or when the animal or article is not deserving of a prize it will be left to the discretion of the Judges to award 1st, 2nd, 3rd or no prize at all.
 8. Any member or agent who interferes with the Judges in any way by pointing out his or her property, will forfeit their prizes for that year.
 9. All protests against the decision of the Judges must be made before the close of the exhibition and must be delivered to the Secretary in writing, stating the cause of the protest, accompanied by a deposit of \$10.00, which will be returned if protest is carried. Any difficulty in respect to the awarding of prizes in any of the departments will be referred to the proper Committee over that Department, who will have power to hear all disputes and report their decision upon the same to the Board of Directors, which, if approved of, will be the final settlement of all protest.
 - 10.The Directors will have a right to deduct a further percentage of the prizes should the funds be insufficient to pay them in full. Prize money paid out may be a combination of \$'s / Value of Gift Certificate / Value of Merchandise.
 - 11.Winners of gift certificates, check with the Secretary OR Treasurer, so you can pick these up in the office.
 - 12.Any Exhibit Hall (excluding Education, 4-H) Prize Money below \$10, not picked up by end of pickup time on Monday will be donated back to the Stormont Agricultural Society.
 13. ALL CHEQUES issued by Stormont Agricultural Society TO BE CASHED BY DECEMBER !, of the current fair year otherwise they will be null and void.
 - 14.While the Directors will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to ensure the safety of articles on exhibition, they wish it to be distinctly understood that the owners themselves must take the risk of articles being stolen; the Directors will give all assistance in their power toward the recovery of the same but will not make any payment for the value thereof.
 15. The Society will not be responsible for any accidents on the grounds.
 16. Anyone caught trying to enter the Fair Grounds without paying could be charged with trespassing and fined up to \$100.00 or more.
No Alcohol on site except in designated area(s). No campfires onsite. No Drugs onsite.
 17. The Electrical Safety Code of Ontario requires that all electrical equipment must be approved before it may be lawfully advertised, displayed, offered for sale, sold or otherwise disposed of used in the Province of Ontario. It is therefore the responsibility of each exhibitor to ensure that all electrical equipment in, or about, their booth comply with the above regulations. This includes the electrical merchandise as well as lighting and display equipment. Should any of this equipment not conform, it is recommended that you request temporary permission to exhibit while the necessary approval certification is being sought. Please write directly to the appropriate inspection department for this area. Any questions concerning regulation for booth wiring should be addressed to the appropriate electrical supplier. Failure of Electrical equipment to comply with the safety code requirements can result in the equipment being refused connection to the source of electrical supply and it may even be ordered removed from the display.
 18. All exhibitors/concessions are requested to comply with the Ontario Fire Code. Fire routes are not to be obstructed. Maintain 4 foot walkways. Access to doorways and electrical panels are not to be obstructed. Appropriate extinguishers are to be maintained. Any combustible/ hazardous items are to conform to the proper code and handled with the appropriate care. No fires are allowed on site.
 19. The SAS respects the privacy of its members, exhibitors, sponsors and volunteers. The information you provide will be used to maintain a membership database. Information from entries forms and/or photos/video may be used to create show catalogues and to publish show results in the newspapers and/or forwarded to the appropriate sponsors as specifically requested.  21. All agricultural implements may be exhibited by agents or manufacturers or farmers. No prize awarded by the Society.
 22. All articles for exhibition in Sections 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25 are to be in their proper place in the Hall at 11:30 a.m. on Friday of Stormont County Fair and to be judged that day; and all animals and implements in Section 8 by 8:30; 7, 9, 10, 12 by 9:30 am, Beef by 10:00 a.m. on the show grounds of the respective show day of the Stormont County Fair and be judged that day; no animals or articles to be removed from the grounds on the show day(s) until permission is granted by the Superintendent in charge.

23. All persons exhibiting in Cattle, Beef, Heavy Horse classes MUST have entries in no later than 2 weeks pre-show day. Light Horse classes no later than 7 days pre-show. Western Gaming classes no later than 4 days pre-show. Cattle (Holstein, Jersey and Ayrshire, Beef) will use AssistExpo for entry information. See website for further info. **All exhibitors must submit signed entry form** and payment if required, to appropriate person listed on the entry form.
24. No animal may be entered in two separate classes, except for a special prize or diploma; but Exhibitors of Registered Livestock may be awarded any one prize if entitled to it in the same section of classes.
25. All animals must be registered in the name of the Exhibitor before closing date of entries. Persons exhibiting Pure Bred stock must give their names and numbers to the Superintendent at the time of judging. Exception in the Light Horse Section.

The Judges appointed in the Home Craft Division are requested to meet and report themselves at the Secretary's office not later than 10:30 am on Friday of Stormont County Fair and will then be furnished with Badges, Class Books so as to enable them to proceed with the judging of their respective classes immediately.

The Judges appointed in Cattle, Beef, Sheep, Horse and 4-H Classes are requested to meet and report themselves to the Secretary's Office not later than 1 hour before show time on the day of the respective show and will be furnished with Badges, Class Books, so as to enable them to proceed with the judging of their respective classes immediately.

The Judges will, in the execution of their duties, be careful to act with the most rigid impartiality; will make their entries in a clear and conspicuous manner; in all cases of doubt or difficulty referring to the Committee of Directors in charge of the Department; and when they have completed their reports, will sign and deliver their books to the Secretary.

Upon the discovery of any fraud, deception or dishonest practice, either in preparation, ownership or misrepresentation concerning any article exhibited, which may have been intended to affect the decision of the judges, the Board of Directors will have the power to withhold the payment of any prize awarded. All participants must be members of the Society.

5. Entry fee will be 20%+HST of winnings, and a \$8.00 membership fee. Late entry fee is an additional

In a food processor, pulse the strawberries and cranberries - you can process them to a finely chopped texture for a completely smooth jam, or leave some fruit partially chopped for a chunkier jam. 2. Pour the processed fruit into a large heavy-bottomed pot. Add sugar and over medium high heat, bring the fruit and sugar mixture to a full rolling boil. 3. Boil for 1 minute. 4. Remove the pot from the heat and add the pectin, stirring to mix completely. 5. Allow the jam to cool for 5 minutes, then skim off the foam on the top. 6. Ladle the hot jam mixture into sterile half-pint jars, leaving ¼ inch head space. Wipe jar rims clean, cover with hot lids and screw on the jar bands. 7. Process the jars for 10 minutes in a water bath.

¾ cup whole pecans 2 cups all-purpose flour ¼ cup sugar 2 tsp baking powder ½ tsp baking soda Pinch of salt 1 ½ sticks unsalted butter - 1 stick cubed and chilled, 4 tbsp melted 1 cup buttermilk 1 tsp cinnamon 6 tbsp pure maple syrup

Step 1 Preheat the oven to 425°F. Spread the pecans in a pie plate and toast for about 6 minutes, until fragrant; let cool slightly.

Step 2 Meanwhile, spray a 12-cup muffin tin with cooking spray. In a food processor, pulse the flour with 2 tbsp of the sugar, the baking powder, baking soda and salt. Add the cubed butter and pulse until it is the size of small peas. Add the buttermilk and pulse a few times, just until a soft dough forms. Turn the dough out onto a floured surface and knead 3 times. Pat or roll the dough into an 8-by-12 inch rectangle. Brush with 2 tbsp of the melted butter.

Step 3 In a small bowl, combine the remaining 2 tbsp of sugar with the cinnamon and sprinkle all over the dough. Beginning at a long side, roll the dough into a tight cylinder and pinch the seam closed. Cut the dough into 12 slices.

Step 4 Divide the maple syrup and the remaining 2 tbsp of melted butter among the cups. Scatter the pecans in the cups and top with the dough pinwheels. Bake for about 18 minutes, until golden; place a baking sheet below to catch any drips. Invert a rack over the rolls and invert them onto the rack. Replace any pecans that get stuck in the cups and let cool for 5 minutes before serving

2 cups (500 mL) frozen raspberries ¼ cup (60 mL) granulated sugar
2 tbsp (30 mL) all-purpose flour ½ tsp (2 mL) ground cinnamon

½ cup (125 mL) seedless raspberry jam ⅓ cup (75 mL) vanilla Canadian Greek yogurt
Step 1 Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C). Line a 9-inch (23 cm) square baking pan with parchment paper; set aside.

Step 2 In a bowl, stir together oats, flour, cinnamon, salt and baking soda. In a large bowl, beat butter, brown sugar and peanut butter until smooth. Beat in egg and vanilla. Stir in oat mixture until well combined. Using lightly floured hands, press two-thirds of the mixture into prepared pan. Bake for 15 minutes until edges are light golden.

Step 3 Raspberry Filling: Meanwhile in a large bowl, toss raspberries with sugar, flour and cinnamon to coat. Stir in jam to combine. Carefully spread raspberry filling over par-baked base and dollop with yogurt. Sprinkle remaining oat mixture over top and pat down lightly.

Step 4 Return to oven for about 30 minutes or until golden brown. Let cool completely before cutting into bars or squares.

1 ½ cups white sugar, divided ¾ cup margarine, melted 1 egg ¼ cup molasses
2 cups all-purpose flour 2 tsp baking soda 1 tsp ground cinnamon ½ tsp salt
½ tsp Ground cloves ½ tsp ground ginger

Step 1 Mix 1 cup sugar, margarine, and egg together in a medium bowl until smooth; stir in molasses.

Step 2 Combine flour, baking soda, cinnamon, salt, cloves, and ginger in a separate medium bowl. Add to the molasses mixture and stir until well combined. Cover and chill dough for 1 hour.

Step 3 Preheat the oven to 375° F.

Step 4 While the oven is preheating, roll dough into 1-inch diameter balls; roll each ball in remaining ½ cup sugar before placing 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheets.

Step 5 Bake in batches in the preheated oven until tops are cracked, about 8 to 10 minutes. Cool on wire racks.

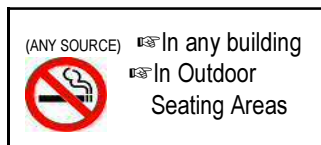
